

Book Trailer or Review

Project Overview

You have the choice of creating either a review or a trailer for your chosen book. In a review, you briefly describe the work and give your opinion about it. A trailer is promotional. You can use any book you like, or you can use a short story. [Here is a list of acceptable short stories](#). Post all deliverables on Google Classroom. All related resources can be found at <http://video.cailab.net>.

What are we learning?

- Types of shots
- How to make a shot list
- How to edit multiple video clips
- How to add titles & sound effects
- How to summarize main elements of a book, including plot, characters, and storylines

Options

You can create a typical trailer or review, the type we're all familiar with. Or you can create something a little different. Here are just some ideas:

- Interview the author
- Interview one or more of the main characters
- Act out a scene from the book
- Make a video about the historical context of the book
- Put one or more main character in a situation (i.e., stuck on an elevator, running into an old friend).

Can you come up with any more creative approaches to this project?

Timeline

We will have six classes to complete the project. Timeline may be adjusted.

Project description in fifty words or less **DELIVERABLE**

Write a clear, concise description of what book your project is about and what form it will take.

Example: "Our project will be about A Wrinkle in Time. We will include a short review of the book and an interview with one of the main characters."

STEPS

Step 1: Script **DELIVERABLE**

Requirements:

- You must use the standard script format. Refer to one of our templates if you're unsure about the format.
- Check your grammar and spelling! It counts towards your grade.

Script Rubric

Step 2: Shot list **DELIVERABLE**

You should have every shot listed on your shot list. You may end up adding some shots or not using all on the list when the times comes to shoot, but your shot list should be a complete list of planned shots.

Requirements for a **pretty good (B)** grade:

- At least twelve shots planned
- At least six different shot types planned
- For each shot on the shot list, include the following information:
 - Brief description of shot- action, characters
 - Scene number and shot number (optional for this project, but at least a number is highly recommended so that you can easily talk about your shots with your team)
 - Shot size/type (close-up, wide shot, etc.)
 - Camera angle
 - Location (INT./EXT.)

Shot list rubric

Step 4: Shoot video

Requirements:

- Between 2-5 minutes in length
- At least six different shots
- At least twelve shots total
- At least one original audio track
- Title and credits
- All your shots must be original! No use of OP (other people's) video or digital images allowed. You may create your own digital images of the book or its contents.

Step 5: Edit

You are encouraged to edit using Adobe Premiere Pro, but if you are editing from home, you may use software of your choice.

Step 6: Export, upload, and share **DELIVERABLE**
